



McClellan A. (Guy) DuBois is vice president of Operational Technologies and Solutions for Raytheon Intelligence and Information Systems (IIS) and the CEO of Raytheon UTD, a wholly owned subsidiary.

The Operational Technologies and Solutions organization and Raytheon UTD specialize in on-site engineering and operations, as well as the design, development, and deployment of systems for high-volume information collection, production, storage, management, and dissemination. Its customer base includes classified users, law enforcement agencies, the Department of Defense, foreign governments, and commercial companies.

Prior to this position, DuBois was vice president for business development and strategic planning.

DuBois joined Raytheon in 1999 after more than 26 years with the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), retiring in December 1998 as a member of the CIA's Senior Intelligence Service. In the late 1970s, he was CIA's senior economist on Asia. After a tour on CIA's presidential support staff where he helped write the President's Daily Brief, DuBois was appointed chief of CIA's Japanese analysis branch. In the mid-1980s, DuBois was special assistant to the Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade.

In 1985, DuBois was appointed chief of CIA's Technology Transfer Analysis Center and chairman of the Director of Central Intelligence's (DCI) interagency Technology Transfer Intelligence

Committee. In this position, he was the director's focal point for issues related to export controls, industrial espionage, and foreign technology developments.

In 1990, DuBois was appointed Director of Operations and Tasking for the national imagery satellite constellation where he managed day-to-day customer requirements for imagery support, including tasking, collection, and dissemination. With the DCI's decision to form the National Imagery and Mapping Agency (now National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency) in 1996, DuBois was appointed deputy director of the Customer Support office.

DuBois holds a bachelor's degree in economics from Washington and Jefferson College, a master's degree in economics from Ohio University, and he is a graduate of the Harvard University Seminar on National Security Policy. He is the author of several articles and speeches on international exchange rates, the Japanese economy, industrial espionage, the craft of intelligence, and imagery support.

DuBois was awarded the DCI Citation for management of imagery resources during the Gulf War, the DCI's Career Intelligence Medal, and the 1998 National Imagery and Mapping Agency Distinguished Civilian Service Medal.
