



Jeffrey A. Taylor is Vice President and General Counsel of Raytheon Integrated Defense Systems. He joined Raytheon in November 2010.

Raytheon Company (NYSE: RTN), with 2011 sales of \$25 billion, is a technology and innovation leader specializing in defense, homeland security and other government markets throughout the world. With headquarters in Waltham, Mass., Raytheon employs 71,000 people worldwide.

With a workforce of more than 13,900 employees and 2011 sales of \$5 billion, IDS provides affordable, integrated solutions to a broad international and domestic customer base, including the U.S. Missile Defense Agency, the U.S. Armed Forces and the Department of Homeland Security.

Before joining Raytheon in November 2010, Taylor was the Americas Leader for Ernst & Young's Fraud Investigation & Dispute Services (FIDS) practice in Washington, D.C. He led a team of more than 300 professionals as managing partner of the firm's forensic accounting, litigation consulting, and technology services business in the Americas. Prior to joining Ernst & Young, he served as the United States Attorney for the District of Columbia from 2006-2009. In that position, he led the nation's largest U.S. Attorney's office and was

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responsible for the investigation and litigation of criminal and civil matters in the D.C. and federal courts. During his tenure he served on the Attorney General's Advisory Committee.

From 2002-2006, Taylor served as Counselor to the Attorney General of the United States at the United States Department of Justice. In that assignment, Taylor served as a senior advisor to two Attorneys General on national security and criminal law matters, including counter terrorism, corporate fraud, and public corruption. In 2006, he won the Edmund J. Randolph Award (the Justice Department's highest honor) for outstanding service.

From 1999-2002, Taylor was Chief Crime Counsel, Majority Staff for the U.S. Senate Committee on the Judiciary where he advised the Committee on criminal law and national security matters. He served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of California from 1995-1999, and was an Associate at the law firm of Latham & Watkins in San Diego, Calif., for three years prior to that.

Taylor received his Juris Doctorate from the Harvard Law School and his Bachelor of Arts from Stanford University. He is a member of the State of California and District of Columbia bars.
